

Mord From Our MINISTER

As I write this, in May of 2025, I am making my way through the voluminous reports for the Church of Scotland's General Assembly of 2025. This will be my first time attending as a commissioner, having had the chance eclipsed by the small matter of Covid 19 when I was due to go in 2020.

Time stands still for no one, and it is impossible for any of us not to be affected by the change around us. Indeed, that eventually becomes the change within us. Even the sturdiest rock is prone to erosion by the elements around it, over time. So, I think it's a useful time to reflect on what has changed for me as a minister, with the gap of 5 years separating my first scheduled

visit to the GA and the one I prepare for now.

The main one is probably certainty. I am much less certain about much more things. Don't worry, I continue to be steadfast in my trust in Christ and the great promises that uphold our faith. But beyond the essentials, the last five years have taught me there is always more to learn. Whether it's ethical issues that confront the church, what mission should look like, and even what Christian faith and discipleship look like, I've realised many of these things don't come with a neat program which we can extract from the Bible. And even when we are doing something that seems right and is fruitful, things can always

change and our approach has to as well. A lot of newly-trained ministers can have big bright ideas, full of certainty about how they are going to lead and do things just right. I definitely started the role with some of that certainty, but the pandemic soon knocked it out of me! I'm grateful for the process over these years which has taught me humility, patience, and flexibility in how we do things. But just as all things change, there is an awe inspiring facet to being part of the church, which is such an old and steadfast institution. In preparing for the GA, I was reminded that 2025 is a special anniversary. This year marks 1700 years since the council of Nicea. Maybe that is a piece of history that doesn't seem relevant to us, but in many ways, that early church council made us what we are today.

In 325 AD, the picture of Christ we take for granted today, as fully God and fully man, one person of the Godhead with two distinct natures, was far from obvious. Fierce debates raged through the Roman Empire about how we should view Jesus of Nazareth, in light of the Apostles teaching. As much as we mark change, it is humbling to know we belong to a faith tradition, in confessing Christ as we do, that has spanned 17 centuries. The result of the council was of course the Nicean creed which has been instrumental in forming Christians all over the world for these 17 centuries. As we look ahead together as a church, no doubt with many more changes to navigate, let us place our hope in the unchanging Christ, and the words of the creed found on the next page.

Nicean Creed:

We believe in one Lord,
Jesus Christ,
The only Son of God,
Eternally begotten of
the Father,
God from God, Light
from Light,

True God from true God, Begotten, not made, Of one being with the Father. Through Him all things were made.

Pastoral Care:

Caring for Each Other, Caring for All-Pastoral Care in Today's Society

One of my favourite passages is the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37), which starts with a question to Jesus, a question that is still central to so many modern issues that the church and our society faces today. In this reading, a teacher of the Law asked Jesus 'who is my neighbour?', a question that still rings out today. How little has changed since this question was asked of Jesus, it's still important today, from the treatment of immigrants, to who can claim care on the NHS. The central tenet of the parable is pastoral care.

The parable states 'a Samaritan, as he travelled, came where the man was; and when he saw him,

he took pity on him.... and took care of him.' It didn't matter to the Samaritan who the injured man was, all that mattered was that the man needed his help and that he was in a position to help him.

We can be overwhelmed by the scale of events in the news or the scale of events affecting ourselves. Jesus taught us in the parable, that caring for others is part of our Christian life. The parable also tells us that caring can start from where we. The Samaritan did not have to go find others to care for, he found it where he was.

As I write this article, we are approaching 2 opportunities to once again show our care for

others; Christian Aid Week and the visitation of elders with members ahead of the June Communion.
Christian Aid, again faces a difficult year, with on-going campaigns for the Myanmar earthquake, the crisis in Sudan, and wars in Ukraine and the Middle east. There are many ways we can show who our neighbour is through the good work that this charity does.

As a church, we have been blessed with hard working and dedicated people, who give up their own time to care for others. Amongst these, are our hard-working Elders, who visit our members on a regular basis, provide them with an opportunity to have a chat and some company.

The pastoral care our Elders provide is vital to how the church connects with its members but its also vital that our elders are themselves cared for. When they visit, welcome them, be open to them and after they leave, pray for them.

I pray that you care for each other, care for your friends and family and care for your neighbours, wherever they be.

Information About GIFT AID



During 2024, we received £15,686 from HMRC in Gift Aid donations. This is a very much appreciated component of the church's income, particularly as costs have risen sharply and other income sources have fallen during the year. Thank you to everyone that has signed up. If you are a UK taxpayer, we can claim 25% of your offering from HMRC if you have paid tax to that value. So for example, if your weekly or monthly payments add up to £400 over a year, we can claim £100 from HMRC if you have paid at least £100 in income tax during that year. We need a signed Gift Aid authorisation form to allow us to add you to the Gift Aid Register.

A Gift Aid claim can only be made for an individual. In some cases, our freewill offerings are made by couples as joint donations. In these circumstances, the Gift Aid claim is made in the name of one person. If a couple wish the Gift Aid claim to be shared between them, each must sign an authorisation form and we will split the total amount donated between two claims.

The form asks for your full name, address and postcode. The personal information on the form is only accessed by the Treasurer or Freewill Co-ordinator and used for Gift Aid claims; it is not used by or disclosed to anyone else in the church. Gift Aid authorisation forms are available from the Treasurer (Marion Menabney) or Freewill Co-ordinator (Margaret Rhoddan). They can also be downloaded from the church website.

If your circumstances change and you stop paying income tax or pay less than a quarter of your freewill offering, you should let us know and we will remove you from the Gift Aid register. This will make sure we don't make a claim for tax you haven't paid.







The Unpaid Carers drop in Café began in January and meets monthly on the last Thursday of each month in the Hub.

Caring for someone can be exhausting and isolating. Our Carers Cafes are monthly, informal get - togethers where carers can chat with other carers over a cup of tea or coffee. They provide carers with a short break from caring and give them the opportunity to build supportive friendships based on shared experiences or just to find common ground through hobbies or interests. The group also allow carers to share ideas, tips, and useful information with each other, and we can organise speakers on caring related issues with support from Renfrewshire Carers Centre.

If you or someone you know is a carer for a loved one, friend or neighbour and would like to meet others in a similar situation, please come along to the Hub on the last Thursday of the month between 11.00am and 12.30pm where you are assured of a warm welcome and a listening ear. There is no charge and refreshments are provided.

The next meeting will be on Thursday, 26th June.`

- Tuesday Brownies... £400


